Scheme of Examination

The question paper for End of Semester Examination of English Literature will be of seventy marks which will be divided into **two parts**:

Part-A and Part-B:

Part A will consist of 10 compulsory questions. There will be at least three questions from each unit and the word limit of the answer will be approximately 50 words. Each question will carry two marks. (10x2=20)

Part B will consist of 10 questions. At least three questions from each unit will be asked and the students will have to answer five questions selecting at least one question from each unit and the word limit of the answer will be approximately 400 words. Each question will carry ten marks. There will be two compulsory questions (with internal choice) from Unit I and II which will require the students to explain a stanza/ passage telling their reference to the context. (5x10=50)

Note- A student has to pass external theory paper i.e. End of Semester Exam and internal Continuous Assessment (CA) separately.
