- 1. The number of paper and the maximum marks for each paper practical shall be shown in the syllabus for the subject concerned. It will be necessary for, a candidate to pass in the theory part as well as in the practice at part (wherever prescribed) of a subject/Paper separately.
- 2. A candidate for a pass at each of the previous and the Final Examination shall be required to obtain (i) at least 36% marks in the aggregate of alt the paper prescribed for the examination and (ii) at least 36% marks in practical (s) wherever prescribed the examination, provided that if a candidate fails to secure at least 25% marks in each individual paperwork, wherever prescribed, he shall be deemed to have failed at the examination not with standing his having obtained the minimum percentage of marks required in the aggregate for that examination. No division will be awarded at the previous Examination; Division shall be awarded at the end of the Final Examination on the combined marks obtained at the previous and the Final Examination taken together, as noted below:

Second Division 48% of the Previous Final Examination.
