In examination each paper will contain three parts A, B, and C.

Part A Marks - 20
All 10 questions are compulsory. The answer of each question should not exceed 20 words. All question carry equal marks.

Part B Marks - 20
All 5 questions are compulsory. The answer of each question should not exceed 50 words. All question carry equal marks.

Part C Marks - 60
The candiate should attempt 3 out of 6 questions selecting one equestion from each unit. The answer should not exceed 400 words. All question carry equal marks.

[Each paper will contain ten questions having two questions from each unit, Candidates are required to attempt five questions in all, selecting at least one question from each unit.] Paper XII contains theory as well as practical part. Functions, types and objectives of commercial banks; The process of credit creation; Liabilities and assets of banks; Role of Commercial banks before and after nationalization in India; Mechanism of credit creation by the commercial banks, purpose and limitations; Pre-requisites of a sound commercial banking system; A brief review of the measures taken to liberalize the financial system - direction of future reforms. Structure of cooperative institutions and development banks in India - their objectives, role and limitations.

Financial Institutions in India

Financial Structure in India. Functions of Financial Institutions in India.

Functions and objectives of Central Bank; Instruments of credit control. Role and functions of the Reserve Bank of India; Development and regulatory role of RBI; inflation - Types, causes and effects of inflation on different sectors of the economy; Demand - pull and cost-push inflation, Measures used by the RBI to control inflation; Recent monetary policy of RBI.

Banking and financial system reforms and their impact on economic growth in India. Definition and types of NBFI's viz., Mutual Funds, LIC, Investment companies, Venture Capital, Growth and importance; Recent measures taken by the RBI and SEBI to regulate their working in the sound monetary management of India.

Unit III

Financial Markets

The structure of Financial markets - Call money, treasury bills and Commercial Bills; The Stock market and market for gilt edged securities; Financial Sector Reforms in India; SEBI and Working of Capital Markets in India.

Foreign Exchange Markets

Foreign exchange; Foreign exchange rate, Foreign exchange market - concepts of spot exchange rates and forward exchange rates; Determination of exchange rates under fixed and flexible exchange rate regime and role of hedging in the determination of exchange rates; Euro-dollar market - its role and significance.
